Norman has now completed the scenery backboards and we hope to have photographs soon.


## **Engines At War**

Pete recently distributed Shunter 122 the newsletter from the Northumberland Area Group (if you haven't received it and would like a copy contact Pete or lan).

In it they mentioned a talk the Group had received from Roger Bagnall on Military Railways and included brief notes. As this was of great interest to Pete with his military interested he contacted Roger via email who provided his original comprehensive notes on the talk.

It all started for Roger in about 1966/67 when he was an instructor at Longmoor and was asked to talk to the AGM of the RCTS in Birmingham. 20 years later he did the same for the Stephenson Locomotive Society in Newcastle, and continued to add to it.

Roger went on to say that he went to a talk by **Christian Wolmar** on the Trans Siberian Railway, and bought one of his other books – 'Engines of War'. This is a detailed book on railways in the military which was described by Roger as " an absolutely excellent read and it must be now the final word on the subject"



In his email Roger expressed his surprise that his fame has travelled afar to Wrexham. Coincidentally Roger spent most of his school holidays with his grandparents in **Penley**, on the Whitchurch Road, and cycled around the collieries et al around Wrexham, Ruabon, Brymbo and Copping industrials. He also recalls making a weekly visit to Croes Newydd and the LNER shed.

Engines at War is one of several books written by Christian Wolmar and currently is available on Amazon in paperback for £6.99.

## Union Pacific American Layout

Work has finally commenced on my home layout. My initial plans were to build a portable layout measuring 4'6" x 3'4" so it could fit in the back of my car. The base board was made last summer using 9mm MDF and 2x1 batons.

This summer after placing a hill in the centre and started laying Kato track. However, after several attempts I could not find a track plan that was satisfactory for my needs.



A rethink was required. My integral single garage was converted some 9 years ago to a wargames room. The idea was that it was to provide storage and an area for game playing. However, over the last 7 years it has kept for storage as I have weekly wargame meetings with ample room to game. The "wargames room" was completely shelved for storage.

I figured I could take the shelving out build a layout with storage below and shelving above.

The first job was to remove the current shelving and remove the stored contents. This meant filling our lounge and dining room was used as a storage room and became a bit of a maze/minefield.

After some research for the best timber prices a trip then ensued to

Wickes. I decided to use 9mm plywood the same depth as my previous base board.

As my woodwork skills are basic I kept construction simple with 2"x1" batons.



Legs were made from 30mm x 30mm timber and one screwed into each corner with a cross beam. Each leg had a T nut underneath with a 25mm bolt screwed in so I could alter the table legs to aid levelling.

The layout is to be "U shaped" and the first 4' x 2' table was erected to the right of the entrance door at a final height of 1.1 metres. This gives a good operating height and allows plenty of storage beneath.



With all the tables installed it gives me an 11 foot run down the left wall with 6' 6" x 2' wide and the remaining 4' 6" x 3' 3" wide. Underneath the window is a 2' 6" x 2' board which is finally joined to the the 4' x 2' board by the door.

Each board was built separately outside and the transported to the room, erected and secured together using T nuts and 40mm bolts.



One top tip I picked up after building the first board was to build the frame about 1 centimetre less than the board so that the outer facing side of the layout has a lip which hides minor discrepancies of construction.



I have laid some track out on the baseboards and already found I need a lot more track and points!



As you can see there is a lot of storage beneath the layout too.



The most rewarding part of this was I was finally able to run some of my American locomotives.
